<u>Call to Order</u>: Meeting called to order at 10:00 a.m. by the Chairman, the Honorable Mayor David Tomita.

<u>Agenda Item 1</u>: Chairman Mayor Tomita proceeded to ask if there were any comments from the public. There were no comments from the public attending the meeting.

Agenda Item 2: The minutes from the September 14, 2017 meeting were reviewed.

Mr. John Hartman made a motion for the board to approve the minutes of the September 14, 2017 meeting. Mr. John Deakins, Jr. seconded the motion. All approved. **Motion carried.**

Agenda Item 3: Consider approval of Self-Certification Resolution

Mr. Glenn Berry reviewed the purpose of the self-certifications and that small urban areas self-certify, unlike large urban areas that must go through a formal federal certification review process. Mr. Berry also reviewed the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and that updates to jurisdictional ADA transition plans are required to be implemented before the next Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) can be approved.

Mayor Tomita asked how do we self-certify. Mr. Berry explained the process for large urbanized areas is they go through a federal review process where the federal agencies do an onsite visit review of their documentation, procedures, etc. For small urbanized areas, the MPO states they adhere to all federal laws in the self-certification resolution. Mr. Berry then gave examples of this, such as the public notice of MTPO meetings, the meetings are held in facilities that are ADA accessible, and then Mr. Berry noted he knows that TDOT oversees compliance with all federally funded transportation projects like traffic signals, road projects, sidewalks, etc. Then Mr. M. Denis Peterson noted that the oversight of those type of projects were not part of the MTPO oversight and compliance. Mr. Berry then corrected himself and stated Mr. Peterson was correct.

Mr. Peterson made a motion for the board to approve the Self-Certification Resolution. Mr. Bob Browning seconded the motion. All approved. **Motion carried.**

<u>Agenda Item 4</u>: Consider approval of amending the Fiscal Year 2017-2020 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to revise the project description and termini of the State Route (SR) 91 Extension Project

Mr. Berry explained history of the SR 91 project and that it began as the Northern Connector Project in Elizabethton. It has changed over the years and is now in the right-of-way phase. TDOT is amending the project description to include improvements to the North Roan Street and East Elk Avenue intersection. They are also shortening the original termini from 5 miles to exactly 4 miles.

Mr. Hartman made a motion for the board to approve the TIP amendment. Mr. Deakins seconded the motion. All approved. **Motion carried.**

<u>Agenda Item 5</u>: Consider approval of recommendation and reaffirmation of the Priority Project List for TDOT's Three-Year Work Program

Mr. Berry proceeded to explain the process of prioritizing projects and that even though a project may be ranked high by the MPOs, TDOT can implement other projects as time and funding permits. The two projects to rank for construction are the Interstate 26 Exit 17 (Boones Creek Road) project as Ranking Number 1 and the SR 91 Extension project as Ranking Number 2. Mr. Berry asked Mr. Mike Russell with TDOT to give an update on the status of the Exit 17 project. Mr. Russell explained that the project is in the Right-of-Way Phase but funding for construction has not been identified. Mr. Russell also noted that TDOT was awaiting the release of HPP funds from FHWA to continue the ROW phase of the SR 91 Project in Carter County.

Mr. Berry then informed the member and guests at the meeting there was a new category to rank is was for the project to begin preliminary engineering that were in the Improve Act. He noted the Johnson City MTPO only had one project included in this category to rank, which is the new state route XXX on Knob Creek Road that was proposed in the IMPROVE Act passed earlier this year.

Mr. Berry informed the Board that he had received a call from a Mr. Jim Taggert and had a long conversation about the status of SR 36 and the last portion to be improved from SR 75 to I-81. Mr. Taggert was upset that the project was taking a very long time. Mr. Berry had to explain to Mr. Taggert that even though we support this project, it is not located in the Johnson City MTPO planning area and there is not much we can do about it. Mr. Berry stated since the conversation with Mr. Taggert he did find out that it was ranked as the number 2 project in the Kingsport MTPO Priority Project List. This project is also supposed to be funded by the IMPROVE Act. Mr. Taggert was informed by someone with TDOT that this project is not in our area, so Mr. Berry proposes writing a letter to TDOT to explain the situation and that this project is not in our area. The Honorable Mayor Dan Eldridge asked if this was located in Washington County. Mayor Eldridge also noted he had received calls from the Sullivan County officials asking to the status of this project and why the Johnson City MTPO was not pursuing the project. Mr. Berry explained that there is a small portion of the unimproved segment of SR 36 located in northern Washington County before it moves into Sullivan County. Mayor Eldridge recommended letting Sullivan County leaders know this was in the Kingsport MTPO. Mr. Berry said he would let them know also.

Next Mr. Berry stated the projects in the agenda, with the exception of the new SR-XXX Knob Creek project, were previously ranked for several years with Exit 17 on I-26 Interchange improvements at SR 354 (Boones Creek Road) being number 1 and the SR 91 Project in Carter County being number 2. He noted while the staff recommended keeping the projects the same ranking it was up to the Board for their consideration and their decision and that while the MTPO may rank a project as number 1 it may not be completed first due to funding, programming scheduling or other reasons.

Mayor Eldridge made a motion for the board to approve the Priority of Projects as proposed. Mr. Deakins seconded the motion. All approved. **Motion carried.**

Agenda Item 6: Consider approval of resolution to support Safety Performance Targets by TDOT

Mr. Berry explained to the Board that they heard about the Safety Performance Targets at the last meeting in September. These safety performance targets are being set to meet the performance measures set by Congress in 2012 in the MAP-21 legislation. Mr. Berry stated that the targets are a rolling five-year average, which is currently 2014-2018, and that a baseline has been set. Each year, the average will move ahead by one year. Unfortunately, the fatality rate is a delicate subject to estimate the average number of deaths that might occur over the five-year period. Mr. Berry has contacted other MPOs across the state, namely Kingsport, Bristol, Lakeway (Morristown) and Memphis MPOs, and they are all supporting the state's targets. Mr. Berry explained the staff expertise and availability of data that would be required in order to set their own targets.

Mayor Tomita stated we could set our targets regionally. Mr. Berry explained due to the complexity of the MTPO geography and data needed, it would be extremely difficult for the MTPO at this time to achieve this and stated this is a new process initiated by Congress and recommended supporting the state's targets at this time, learn how the process proceeds, and adjust as deemed necessary.

Mr. Troy Ebbert said there would be other performance measures and targets to be set in the future, notably pavement management. Mr. Deakins said this was very much like the drive to zero initiative to eliminate all

deaths on highway. Mayor Tomita responded by saying it is recommended we bless the state's targets and keep doing what we are doing. Mr. Berry said yes.

The Honorable Mayor Dan Eldridge made a motion for the board to approve the resolution to support Safety Performance Targets by TDOT. The Honorable Mayor David Tomita seconded the motion. All approved. **Motion carried.**

Agenda Item 7: Annual Listing of Obligated Projects

Mr. Berry went over the purpose of the Annual Listing of Obligated Projects. This list includes all funding that is obligated for a project. Amounts listed in red is funding that is returned to the state as that money was left over for a project. Full size handouts of the listing are available to the members.

Agenda Item 8: Progress Update and Draft of the 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan

Mr. Preston Elliott of KCI Technologies gave a short update about the 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). Ms. Mary Butler handed out an Executive Summary that KCI created as a short, concise version of the full document. Mr. Elliott explained that they had received comments from FHWA and FTA and that there were three required changes along with various other suggested changes. The required changes can be addressed by simply removing a couple of sentences. Mr. Elliott gave a brief overview of the remaining schedule to adopt the MTP. The public review period will begin on December 27 and end January 25, 2018. A public meeting is scheduled for January 11, 2018. An Executive Board meeting will be schedule for February to adopt the plan.

Agenda Item 9: Other Business

Mr. Berry proceeded to close the meeting by showing a video he took at the Johnson City Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony. He wished everyone a Merry Christmas and thanked them for coming.

Adjourn: There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:33 a.m.

Resolution 2018-01: Consider a resolution to adopt the 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan

The Johnson City MTPO has completed the update to the Johnson City MTPO 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). The 2045 MTPO is ready to be considered for adoption by the Executive Board. The 2045 MTP has been reviewed by the Tennessee Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration. The afore-mentioned agencies are in concurrence that the document has been developed in compliance with federal law, has demonstrated fiscal constraint, and significant public outreach has been involved in developing the updated plan. The 30-calendar day public comment period on the final draft ran from December 27, 2017 until January 25, 2018. A public meeting was held on January 11, 2018. The plan has been made available in electronic format, with a hardcopy version available at the MTPO office.

WHEREAS, the Johnson City MTPO does hereby certify that the requirements of the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 23, Section 450.334 are met.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Executive Board and Executive Staff of the Johnson City Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization does hereby approve and endorse the following certifications, as set forth in 23 CFR Section 450.334, as to be submitted with the Johnson City MTPO Area FY 2014-2017 TIP as amended.

Resolution 2018-03: Consider approval of amending the Fiscal Year 2017-2020 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to add funding to a project and add a new project for Johnson City Transit

Johnson City Transit (JCT) has received residual funds from TDOT, which are unused funds that have been reallocated to meet the current needs of transit agencies, for two different projects.

The first is a current project, Project 2014-10 - Paratransit Vehicles/Buses/Technology, that is being amended as follows to add a total of \$1,513,619:

- 1) Revised FY 2017 Section 5307 funding ratios, but total amount still the same Federal (add \$106,282), State (minus \$53,141), and Local (minus \$53,141);
- Added additional total funds of \$213,792 (\$181,724 Federal, \$16,034 State, \$16,034 Local) to FY 2017 Section 5339;
- 3) Added FY 2015 total residual funds of \$1,099,827 (\$935,103 Federal, \$82,362 State, \$82,362 Local) that was reallocated by TDOT to JCT to FY 2018 Section 5307; and
- 4) Added additional total funds of \$200,000 (\$170,000 Federal, \$15,000 State, \$15,000 Local) to FY 2020 Section 5339.

A new project page is being added, 2014-15 – New Freedom, to accept a total of \$500,000 in residual Section 5317 New Freedom funds that are being reallocated:

- 1) Added total residual Section 5317 funds of \$200,000 (\$100,000 Federal, \$50,000 State, \$50,000 Local) that was reallocated by TDOT to JCT to FY 2018 Section 5317 for Operations;
- 2) Added total residual Section 5317 funds of \$50,000 (\$40,000 Federal, \$5,000 State, \$5,000 Local) that was reallocated by TDOT to JCT to FY 2018 Section 5317 for Acquisitions/Purchases;
- Added additional total funds of \$150,000 (\$75,000 Federal, \$37,500 State, \$37,500 Local) to FY 2019 Section 5317 for Operations; and
- 4) Added additional total funds of \$100,000 (\$80,000 Federal, \$10,000 State, \$10,000 Local) to FY 2019 Section 5317 for Acquisitions/Purchases.

The residual funds for both of these projects will assist in the purchase of buses and the Section 5317 funds will provide for operations of the New Freedom routes.

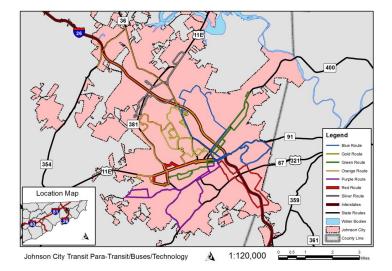

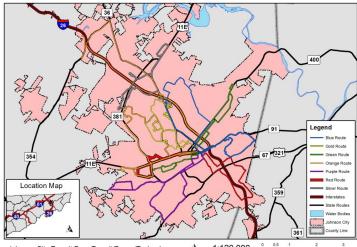

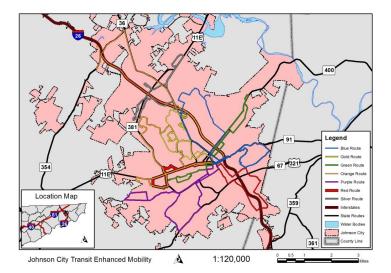

Resolution 2018-04: Consider approval of an amendment to the Fiscal Year 2018 Unified Planning Work Program to add a new task and add additional funding from Consolidated Planning Grant

The Johnson City MTPO is amending the Fiscal Year 2018 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) in order to add funding from the newly created Consolidated Planning Grant that will combine Planning (PL) funds from the Federal Highway Administration and Section 5303 – Metropolitan Planning funds from the Federal Transit Administration into one streamlined grant. In order to receive the Fiscal Year 2017 allocation of Section 5303 grant funds through the Consolidated Planning Grant, the FY 2018 UPWP will need to be amended to add those funds to Task D – Transit Planning. A total of \$62,972, of which \$50,378 is federal, \$6,297 is state match and \$6,297 is local match, is being added to Task D. The new grand total of both funding sources for Task D is \$133,227. Tables 2, 5, 6 and 7 have also been revised.

The FY 2018 UPWP is also being amended to add a new task, Vehicle Procurement, which will become the new Task E. The new vehicle will replace the current vehicle utilized by the MTPO staff for daily and business travel use. The vehicle will be procured using previously available funds in the grant contract but not programmed in the UPWP for a total of \$30,000, of which \$24,000 is Federal Highway Administration PL 112 Program funds and \$6,000 is local match. The document has been updated throughout to add this new task, along with the Tables 2, 5, 6 and 7 revised.

Also, the old Task E - Contingency has been renamed as simply "Contingency".

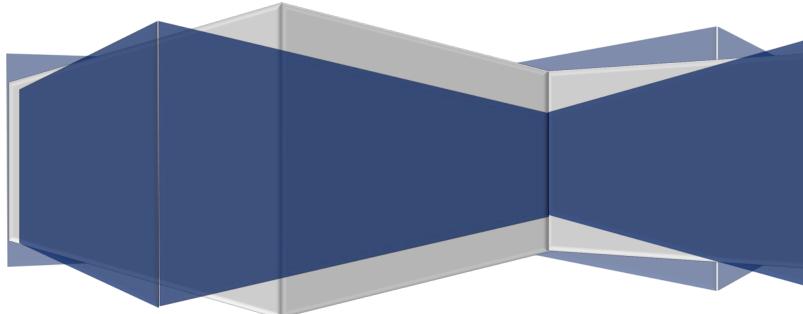

Federal Fiscal Year 2018 October 1, 2017 to September 30, 2018



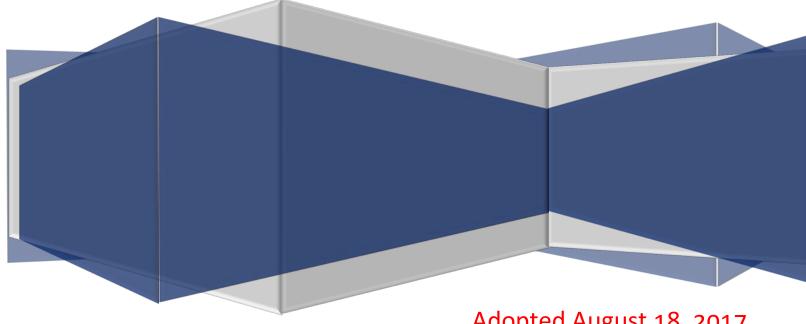

The intention of the performance-based planning requirement is for the U.S. DOT to set national performance measures and then the State and MPOs in turn set performance targets. The Johnson City MTPO staff will work closely with TDOT to set performance targets in FY 2018.

Funding

The primary funding source to accomplish tasks identified in the UPWP is provided by two programs. First, the FHWA Section 112 Metropolitan Transportation Planning funds (PL 112) and second, the FTA Section 5303 Transit Planning funds. As with most grants, matching funds are required. Shown in Table 1 below and Table 2 on the next page is the funding program, required matching ratios and the amounts. In addition to these funding sources, TDOT receives State Planning and Research (SPR) funds. TDOT utilizes these funds to assist in transportation planning activities for the Johnson City MTPO.

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Tennessee receives a direct apportionment of FHWA Section 112 Metropolitan planning (PL) funds and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5303 planning funds. Beginning with this amendment on this UPWP, TDOT participates in the Consolidated Planning Grant (CPG) Program, where FHWA and FTA planning funds are combined into a single fund administered by FHWA. The funds are distributed to the MPOs and administered by TDOT's Long Range Planning Division in accordance with 23 CFR 420.109. The PL distribution formula gives each MPO a base amount plus an amount based on their 2010 Census Urbanized Area Population and the formula also retains a small portion for TDOT to use for the benefit of all the MPOs. The distribution formula for the 5303 funds is based on each MPO's 2010 Census Urbanized Area Population.

The funds originating with FHWA require a 20% local match, resulting in an 80% Federal/20% Local split. The funds originating with FTA also require 20% matching funds. TDOT provides half of the match, resulting in an 80% Federal/10% State/10% Local split.

Depending on the task, other funding sources may be used. If so, they are identified in the detail section of each task in the UPWP. However, it should be noted without the FHWA PL 112 and FTA Section 5303 funds, the Johnson City MTPO would not be able to operate in its current capacity as the majority of these funds are used for its operations. Both of these programs are administered by TDOT with the City of Johnson City providing the local matching funds.

The annual allocation for FHWA PL 112 funds are based on official population numbers from the decennial census conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau for the Johnson City Urbanized Area. The official Johnson City Urbanized Area population in the 2010 Census is 120,415. This figure will be valid until the U.S. Census Bureau releases new population figures for urbanized areas after the 2020 Census. This usually occurs within two years after the completion of the decennial census.

Depending on the task, other funding sources may be used. If so, they are identified in the detail section of each task in the UPWP. However, it should be noted without the FHWA PL 112 and FTA Section 5303 funds, the Johnson City MTPO would not be able to operate in its current capacity as the majority of these funds are used for its operations. Both of these programs are administered by TDOT with the City of Johnson City providing the local matching funds.

The annual allocation for FHWA PL 112 funds are based on official population numbers from the decennial census conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau for the Johnson City Urbanized Area. The official Johnson City Urbanized Area population in the 2010 Census is 120,415. This figure will be valid until the U.S. Census Bureau releases new population figures for urbanized areas after the 2020 Census. This usually occurs within two years after the completion of the decennial census.

Johnson City MTPO Focus Areas

The following accomplishments were achieved for the Johnson City MTPO in FY 2017:

- Drafted and adopted a new FY 2018 UPWP;
- Maintained the FY 2014-2017 TIP with amendments and adjustments;
- Drafted and adopted the FY 2017-2020 TIP;

- Expanded GIS capabilities by participating in the citywide Esri Enterprise License, with ArcGIS Online included (which enhances visualization techniques);
- Received completed 3D elevation data from United States Geological Services (USGS) for analysis;
- Finalized the launch of the electronic TIP database and interactive website;
- Analyzed commercial data to use for the update of the LRTP and provided it to the consultant;
- Continued the process of updating the LRTP by holding planning/stakeholder and public meetings;
- Finalized the draft of the LRTP for review by TDOT and FHWA/FTA;
- Worked with TDOT to prepare performance targets for metropolitan planning and safety;
- Prepared transit performance targets for state of good repair in cooperation with JCT;

in MAP-21 and the FAST Act, as explained further in this document. With this in mind, the Johnson City MTPO has developed the following priorities for FY 2018.

Priorities for Fiscal Year 2018

Priorities for the Johnson City MTPO UPWP first include the required federal documents that must be adopted and maintained in order to comply with federal laws and regulations and remain eligible to receive federal funds for transportation and transit projects. The staff of the Johnson City MTPO also meets with the staff of local jurisdictions and JCT to determine other planning needs for the upcoming year. The following represents the major activities for the FY 2018 UPWP:

- 1. TDOT, Johnson City MTPO, and public transportation providers will work together to establish performance targets for the Johnson City MTPO;
- 2. Maintain the Johnson City MTPO 2040 LRTP with adjustments and amendments as needed;
- 3. Continue the process of updating the LRTP as it goes through the state and federal review process and public comment period;
- 4. Adopt the final Johnson City MTPO 2045 LRTP prior to March 2018;
- 5. Maintain the current FY 2017-2020 TIP with adjustments and amendments as needed;
- 6. Maintain the FY 2018 UPWP through any necessary adjustments or amendments;
- 7. Update the website for the Johnson City MTPO to meet the needs of mobile users and accessibility requirements;
- 8. Develop the FY 2019 UPWP for submission to TDOT, FHWA, and FTA;
- 9. Participate as a stakeholder in regional transit planning meetings with Johnson City, Kingsport and Bristol;
- 10. Finalize the completion of the Comprehensive Operational Analysis for JCT; and
- 11. Finalize the completion of the bus procurement package for the purchase of medium-duty buses for JCT;
- 12. Continue to utilize GIS capabilities and databases, including data from the U.S. Census Bureau, Esri Enterprise applications and ArcGIS Online, to support transportation planning efforts by the Johnson City MTPO; and
- 13. Monitor air quality regulations to prepare for potential impacts of new regulations from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

Johnson City MTPO Metropolitan Planning Area

The Johnson City MTPO Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) consists of the Town of Bluff City, the City of Elizabethton, the City of Johnson City, the Town of Jonesborough, a portion of the Town of Unicoi, and parts of Carter, Sullivan and Washington Counties. Under current federal law, at a minimum any urbanized area with a population over 50,000 must be in an MPA for a Metropolitan Planning Organization

- 11. Finalize the completion of the bus procurement package for the purchase of medium-duty buses for JCT;
- 12. Continue to utilize GIS capabilities and databases, including data from the U.S. Census Bureau, Esri Enterprise applications and ArcGIS Online, to support transportation planning efforts by the Johnson City MTPO;
- 13. Monitor air quality regulations to prepare for potential impacts of new regulations from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA); and
- 14. Procure an MTPO staff vehicle.

Johnson City MTPO Metropolitan Planning Area

The Johnson City MTPO Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) consists of the Town of Bluff City, the City of Elizabethton, the City of Johnson City, the Town of Jonesborough, a portion of the Town of Unicoi, and parts of Carter, Sullivan and Washington Counties. Under current federal law, at a minimum any urbanized area with a population over 50,000 must be in an MPA for a Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). The map in Figure 1 on the next page shows the Johnson City MTPO Urbanized Area, as well as the MPA boundaries for the Johnson City MTPO. The current boundary was adopted by the Johnson City MTPO Executive Board at its meeting on October 9, 2014 and approved by the Governor of the State of Tennessee on December 17, 2014.

Organizational Structure

The Johnson City MTPO is comprised of an Executive Board, Executive Staff and administrative staff. The Executive Board is the overall governing body for the Johnson City MTPO and is supported by the Executive Staff and the Johnson City MTPO administrative staff.

Executive Board

The Executive Board is the governing body of the Johnson City MTPO and has the authority to adopt plans, programs, and policies. The Executive Board is comprised of the top elected officials from the member jurisdictions.

Federal Planning Emphasis Areas

The U.S. DOT has also identified three Planning Emphasis Areas that the Johnson City MTPO will incorporate into the work tasks and resulting products provided for in this UPWP.

1. Models of Regional Planning Cooperation

The Johnson City MTPO will promote cooperation and coordination across MPO boundaries to ensure a regional approach to transportation planning. A memorandum of agreement (MOA) between the Johnson City MTPO and the Kingsport MTPO designates that the Johnson City MTPO will conduct planning activities in the portion of the Kingsport Urbanized Area which is currently within the Johnson City city limits. The Kingsport and Johnson City Urbanized Areas are adjacent and the Johnson City MTPO MPA boundary extends into the Kingsport Urbanized Area. The MOA defines the planning responsibilities for each MTPO MPA boundary.

- 9. System Resiliency Improve the resiliency and reliability of the transportation system and reduce or mitigate stormwater impacts of surface transportation.

The three MPOs in the Tri-Cities area, which are Bristol, Kingsport and Johnson City, are also working together to promote regional transit planning through meetings that involve all three MPOs, all three urban transit providers, the rural transit provider, along with elected officials and administrators from 16 jurisdictions. This transit planning process will determine how to best provide transportation for people who live inside the urbanized areas but outside the urban transit providers' service areas.

2. Access to Essential Services

The Johnson City MTPO, as part of the transportation planning process, will identify transportation connectivity gaps in access to essential services. The Coordinated Public Transit – Human Services Transportation Plan is a joint effort of the Johnson City MTPO and Johnson City Transit that identify gaps in transit services and determines cost effective improvements that result in a better transit system. It should be noted not all gaps may be met due to funding limitations. However, the opportunity to coordinate between transit systems, service providers, and other human services agencies is crucial in planning an efficient system focusing the services on the population in need of transit. In addition, the Johnson City MTPO will finalize a revision to the PPP by the end of FY 2016.

3. MAP-21 and FAST Act Implementation

Once the U.S. DOT has issued the final rule regarding the performance framework and TDOT and the Johnson City MTPO has set performance targets, the Johnson City MTPO will participate in the development and implementation of a performance management approach to transportation planning and programming, which will include the development and use of performance measures, target setting, performance reporting, and transportation investments that support the achievement of performance targets. These components will ensure achievement of transportation system performance outcomes.
